Residential Brush and Limb Collection

Curbside collection of brush and limbs will begin Monday, **October 5, 2026**. All material must be placed curbside on a dedicated Township street or road by this date, **but not before, September 26, 2026**. If material is placed curbside prior to **September 26th**, **you will be contacted to remove it!** If a resident has too much material to be placed curbside at one time, arrangements must be made with a commercial trimmer to handle the excess. Due to the restricted available space, first priority pick-up will be given to Baltimore Street, York Street, Frederick Street and Carlisle Street. The requirements are:

1. Limbs no larger than 3" in diameter or smaller than 1/2" in diameter.
2. Will not accept lumber, boards, etc.

Township crews will pick up one time per neighborhood.

The Township reserves the right to refuse items that do not meet the requirements and is **NOT** responsible for clean up. For questions please call 717-632-7366 ext. 3302.

You can also dispose of this material at Oldcastle Lawn & Garden (formerly H & H Excavating) located at 660 Old Hanover Road in Spring Grove. They accept leaves, brush, limbs and tree trunks only. Shredding Event

Free Penn Township Residential Document Shredding Must Show Proof of Residency

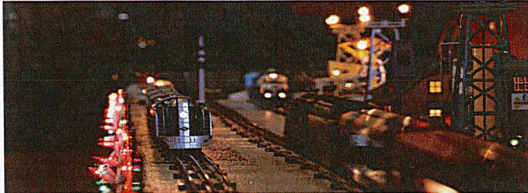
If you have sensitive or private documents that need to be destroyed, you can bring them to the Recycling Center located at 1020 Wilson Avenue, Saturday, **October 17, 2026**. Shredding Solutions Inc. will be on hand from 8:00am until 1:00pm to shred financial, medical, personal, and any other confidential records for **Penn Township residents only**. There is a **5 file box limit per vehicle**. The typical size of a file box is 18"L x 12"W x 10"H.

Residential Leaf Collection

Leaf collection is scheduled to begin Monday, **October 19, 2026**. Leaves should be raked to the gutter, curb, or shoulder of any dedicated Township road or street between **October 16th and December 6th**. Leaves **must not** be placed in plastic bags or in any other container and must be free of branches, limbs, or any other type of debris (i.e., paper, bottles, cans, grass clippings, etc.) or they **will not** be picked up. Due to restricted available space, first priority pick-up will be given to Baltimore Street, York Street, Frederick Street and Carlisle Street. For questions please call 717-632-7366 x 3302.

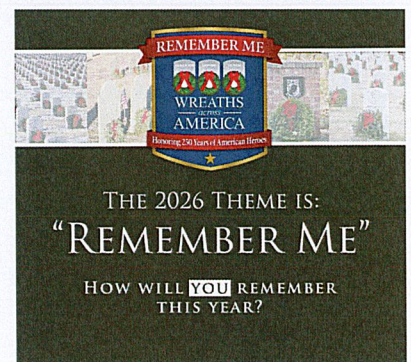

Sewer Billing

CREDIT CARD PAYMENTS - For your convenience the Township Sewer Department accepts **online credit card payments** for sewer bills. If you would like to take advantage of this service, please visit the Township website at www.penntwp.com. Click "Online Payment" and follow the prompt. You may also pay with your credit card at the Township office. Processing fees apply to both online and in office payments.

AVOID WATER SHUT OFF - The Borough of Hanover follows Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission regulations regarding water service shut-offs for delinquent accounts. When a water or sewer bill remains unpaid, water service may be terminated until full payment is received or a payment schedule has been established. Same day restoration of water service following a shut-off for non-payment is no longer feasible due to the expansion of the Borough's water system.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

Winter Property Maintenance Tips

BRUSH AND LIMBS Once the time passes for free pick up, it is the responsibility of the resident to properly dispose of any additional brush and limbs. **DO NOT** place at the curb for garbage or bulk pick up.

SNOW REMOVAL All sidewalks, walkways, stairs, driveways, parking spaces and similar areas shall be kept in a proper state of repair, and maintained free from hazardous conditions, including snow and ice.

ADDRESS NUMBERS Address numbers must be plainly visible from the street. These numbers shall contrast with their background and be a minimum of 3 inches high for residential use.

RESIDENTIAL LIGHTING It is the responsibility of the property owner to activate their residential lighting daily from sunset to sunrise. Using an UL recognized photo electric control cell to turn lights on and off eliminates forgetting.

PREVENTATIVE MAINTENANCE Do you disconnect your outside garden hose to help prevent freezing? Have you started your snow blower? Has your furnace been serviced?

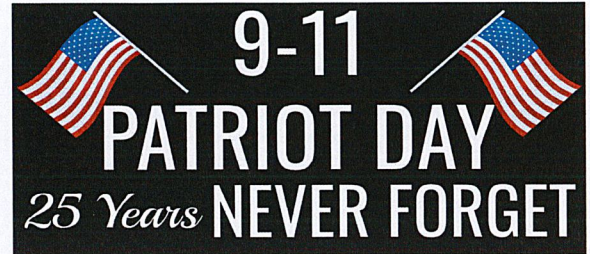

Fire Prevention Week is October 4th through October 10th, 2026. The theme this year is "Charge into Fire Safety: Safe Charging Is a Superpower." The focus this year is lithium-ion battery charging safety.

Many of the devices in our daily lives - phones, tablets, laptops, tools, toys, e-bikes, and scooters, to name a few, run on rechargeable lithium-ion batteries, which store high amounts of energy in a small space. If the batteries are damaged or charged incorrectly, they can overheat, start a fire, or even explode.

"Properly charging devices can significantly reduce the risk of fires and associated hazards," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of Outreach and Advocacy at NFPA. "Making informed choices and practicing simple habits are critical to these efforts."

NFPA does not yet track data on the number of U.S. home fires involving lithium-ion batteries, but an increasing number of lithium-ion battery fires and explosions reported by fire departments, news outlets, and other sources underscores the potential hazards they present. The following are key messages that support this year's Fire Prevention Week theme:

- Use the cord and charger that came with your device or ones approved by the manufacturer. Using the wrong charger can damage the battery and increase the risk of fire.
- Charge devices on a table, desk, or other hard, flat surface. Do not charge them on beds, couches, or under pillows. Devices and chargers produce heat during normal charging. Soft surfaces can trap heat and block airflow, which can cause the battery to overheat.
- Stop using your device if it feels very hot, starts to swell, is smoking, or has a strange smell. These are warning signs that the battery may be damaged or failing.
- Unplug your device when it is fully charged. Do not leave it plugged in longer than needed. Leaving a device plugged in too long can increase heat and stress on the battery.
- Charge larger items like e-bikes, scooters, and power tools outside and away from exits. These batteries are larger and store more energy. If they fail, fires can grow quickly and spread.
- When on a plane, keep your device where you can see it while charging. Do not charge devices in overhead compartments. Do not charge e-cigarettes or vapes on a plane. If a battery overheats or fails, it is important for the flight crew to respond quickly.

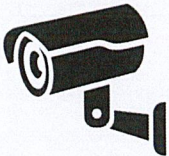
POLICE

Some costumes can be very dark. We suggest adding reflective material, flashing lights and/or glow sticks to costumes to make them visible to passing motorists.

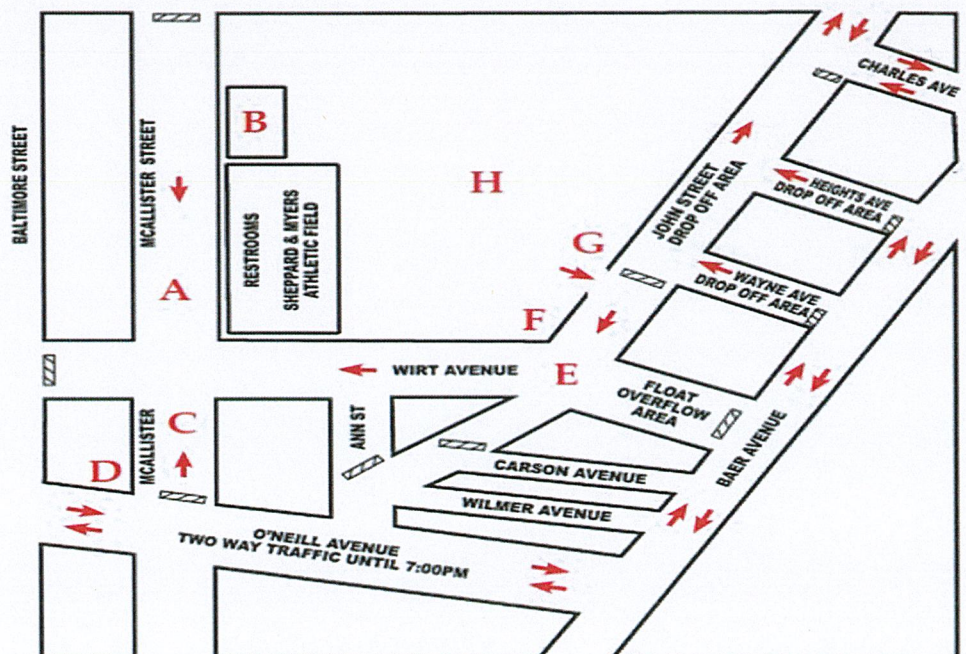
HANOVER AREA JAYCEES HALLOWEEN PARADE - OCTOBER 29th 7:00pm

Snow Emergency Routes

Residents are reminded that Penn Township has established snow emergency routes.

These routes, designated by signs, are:

John Street and Wirt Avenue to Baltimore Street (500-600 block)

All of West Granger Street

Westminster Avenue from Frederick Street to West Granger Street

To the boundaries of Hanover Borough, West Manheim Township and Conewago Township:

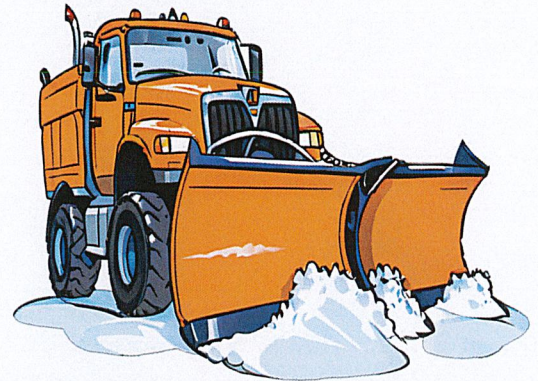
All of York Street (Rt. 116) All of Baltimore Street (Rt. 94) All of Frederick Street (Rt. 194)

Residents and businesses located along these roadways are reminded that when the Chief of Police puts a snow emergency into effect, all parked vehicles must be removed from the roadway in order for plows to clear the roadway from curb to curb. Parking restrictions along these designated routes will be enforced immediately after a snow emergency is put into effect. Once the snow emergency has been lifted, normal parking will resume. Residents are reminded to not throw or blow snow onto the roadway.

PUBLIC WORKS

How Residents and Property Owners Can Help Assure the Safety and Efficiency of Penn Township's Snow and Ice Control Operations

- A. Do not park on township streets, especially during snow or ice events (cars may be towed and fined where there is no street parking signage)
- B. Keep basketball devices at least 10 feet from the edge of pavement.
- C. Do not park cars in driveways within 10 feet of the edge of pavement.
- D. Do not allow children to build and occupy snow forts and similar creations within 10 feet of the edge of pavement.
- E. Do not relocate snow from driveways and sidewalks into the paved street. This is in violation of Pennsylvania law and will cause a hazardous condition on the street. (PA C.S., Chapter 55)
- F. Fences should not be within 10 feet of the edge of pavement.
- G. Remove all non-permanent seasonal items from within 10 feet of edge of pavement.
- H. Trim trees so that branches do not extend beyond the back of the curb.
- I. Pile most of the snow from the driveway throat on the traffic downstream side. This will minimize visibility problems.

Storm Sewer System

MS4 is an acronym for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System. These are the storm drains along the side of the road, these drains go directly into creeks, streams, rivers and ultimately the Chesapeake Bay.

Federal regulations define an MS4 illicit discharge as "...any discharge to an MS4 (storm sewer) that is not permitted or composed entirely of storm water." Intentionally partaking in an illicit discharge is a property maintenance violation. The most common sources of illicit discharges are:

- Sanitary wastewater
- Grass Clippings/ Leaves
- Spills from roadway accidents
- Draining swimming pools
- Car washing wastewater
- Improper auto and household fluid disposal

As you can see, some of our daily routines have the potential to contribute to MS4 Illicit Discharges which all affect our water, our environment, and ultimately our quality of life. Do your part by reporting illicit discharges to Penn Township at 717- 632-7366 ext.1145.

Commercial Recycling

Recycling isn't just for residential homes, apartments and townhouses. As required by Pennsylvania Act 101 and Penn Township Ordinance 434, businesses, industries and institutions must establish a commercial recycling program which, at a minimum, collects and recycles (1) high grade paper including white bond, typing, copier, note pad, writing, computer and other non-glossy office paper; (2) corrugated cardboard; and (3) aluminum cans. Businesses that do not utilize the Township's curbside program or drop off center are required to provide written documentation as to the type and weight of the material recycled. Commercial reporting forms are available on the Township website. For questions on completing the report, please call 717-637-1561.

Clothing and Textiles Recycling

The Penn Township Commissioners have an agreement with the Community Aid Thrift Store located in the South Hanover Shopping Center alongside Giant Foods. When you recycle clothing and textiles by depositing them into a Community Aid bin located in the Township, including the Township's recycling center, you are not only helping your neighbors in need, but also supporting the Township's recycling program. You are encouraged to drop your clothing and textiles into one of their light brown clothing collection bins.



Help Eliminate Litter and Illegal Dumpsites

To help our community celebrate Earth Day every day of the year, York County residents, organizations, civic groups, schools, and neighborhoods that want to clean up litter or eliminate illegal dumpsites, can dispose of waste from a clean-up effort free of charge at the York County Resource Recovery Center. 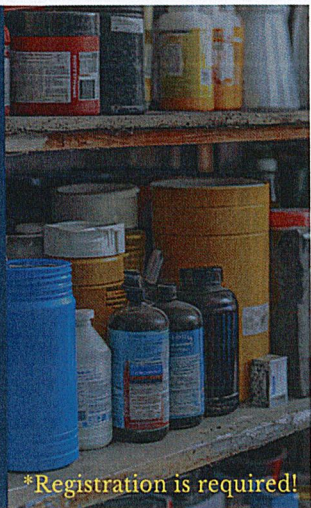

Do Not Put Rechargeable Batteries In Your Curbside

Trash or Recycling Bin!

If you own a cellphone or cordless power tool, you own a rechargeable battery. While convenient during their lifetime, rechargeable batteries require **proper disposal** when they are no longer usable.

Conventional disposal of these types of batteries can cause problems!

Trash is compacted both in the garbage truck and at the waste-to-energy facility. When subjected to intense pressure, these batteries combust and ignite causing fires in either garbage trucks or at the facility. Do not place rechargeable batteries in your recycling bin.

NOTE: Household alkaline batteries like Eveready, Duracell (AA, AAA, 9-volt, C, or D sizes) can be disposed in your regular trash.

Newsprint, Junk Mail, Inserts & Shredded Paper: Place in container marked “**Newsprint**”. Items must be loose, tied or in brown paper bags. Please take material out of plastic bags.

Magazines: Place loose in container marked “**Magazines**”. Please, no newsprint comingled with the magazines.

Eyeglasses, Cases and Hearing Aids: Place in bucket marked “**Eyeglasses & Hearing Aids**”. Only complete eyeglasses and hearing aids. We donate them to the Lion’s Club for families in need.

Corrugated and Cardboard: Must be broken down, can be loose or placed in boxes, brown paper bags or tied. Place in trailer marked “**Cardboard**”. The Township accepts both corrugated and cardboard. What’s the difference? See examples below:

Corrugated: appliance boxes, moving boxes

Cardboard: shoe boxes, gift boxes, soda cases, cereal boxes, pizza boxes, dry food goods

No Waxed Inserts, No Soiled Pizza Boxes, and No Styrofoam: put into your trash

Clothing and Textiles: Place bagged material in the Community Aid collection bin. This includes **ONLY** new and slightly worn items.

American Flags: Place in bin marked “**American Flags**”. The flags will be disposed of in a dignified manner by The Hanover Elks Lodge #763.

Scrap Metal: Place in the “**Metals**” dumpster. Mowers and motors must have the gasoline and oil drained. We cannot accept anything that contains Freon.

Electronics: TV’s, computers (*please remove hard drive or delete*), stereos, remote controls, cell phones, vacuums, microwaves, fans, lamps and small household appliances, just about anything with an electric cord. We accept from **York County Residents Only**. We **do not** accept loose rechargeable batteries. Contact Lowes or Home Depot about their recycling program or visit www.ycswa.com/hazardous-waste-event/.

Ink Cartridges: Place in bin marked “**Ink Cartridges**”.

NO DISPOSING OF MATERIAL EXCEPT DURING POSTED HOURS OF OPERATION, AREA IS UNDER 24-HOUR VIDEO SURVEILLANCE.

Above guidelines strictly enforced. Violators will be subject to fines and penalties by Ordinance #434, as amended.

York County Special Needs Registry

The York County Special Needs Registry is a free, confidential, and voluntary program provided by the York County Office of Emergency Management. The program helps local emergency responders and police quickly access vital information during an emergency.

Any York County resident who feels they may need additional assistance in an emergency situation should register for the program.

Information collected will be forwarded to and maintained by Penn Township and may be shared with first responders, such as local emergency management agencies, emergency medical service, police, fire departments, and first responders to provide safe, proper assistance during an emergency or disaster.

How the Registry Works

- Purpose: It provides standardized information to police, fire, and EMS units before or during an emergency, reducing response time and confusion.
- Confidentiality: All submitted data is kept secure and confidential, then shared only with local municipal emergency management teams.
- Voluntary: Signing up requires a completed form, and participation is entirely voluntary.

Who Can Register

Residents can sign up for themselves or a family member with specific challenges, including:

- Wheelchair, motorized scooter, walker, or cane use
- Being confined to a bed
- Medical support equipment like oxygen or ventilators
- Alzheimer's, dementia, or developmental and intellectual disabilities
- Being blind, deaf, or hard of hearing
- Using a service animal

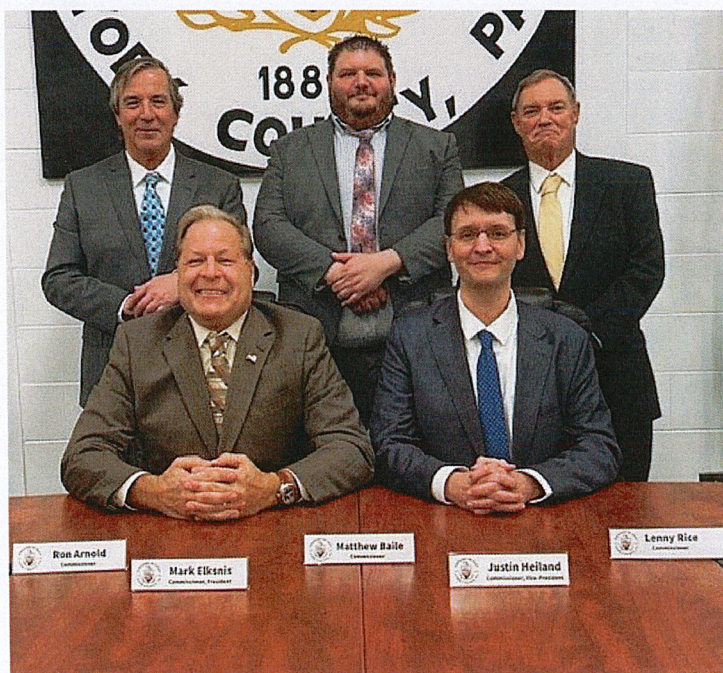
